Growing up on the dusty streets of Lagos, Nigeria, is not easy. With a population of almost 15 million people, Lagos is the largest city in the country, and the entire continent of Africa. When travellers come from around the world, they are captivated by its many glossy skyscrapers, but there is a far deeper and darker side to it.

My parents worked in the oil industry, so we were well-off and we lived in a tranquil estate which was fenced off and protected round the clock by armed security guards. In my estate, there were perfectly-paved tar roads, pavements lined with majestic palm trees, and state-of-the-art air-conditioned buildings designed by famous architects. However, each time we left the estate for school or work, we would see the real Lagos. It was one in which roads had potholes, narrow walkways where the sun shone mercilessly on the pedestrians, and poorly-built homes which baked like ovens on sunny days and acted like watering cans on rainy days.

While I could see how Lagos was like, my protective parents never allowed me out on the streets. Victor, our gardener, noticed that I had been disturbed by the contrast between my life and that of most other children in Lagos, and he sat me down one day after breakfast.

"Nelson, do you really want to experience what life is like in the real Lagos?" Victor asked, in his usual kind but serious tone.

"Definitely. Can you help convince Papa and Mama? Please?" I pleaded.

Victor nodded as he felt that the experience would help me to learn empathy. That night, he proposed a solution that would satisfy both my curiosity and my parents' concern for my safety. Victor would let me live at his home that weekend and I could interact with the children in his neighbourhood. He would act as my bodyguard and would inform my parents every hour about how I was doing. My parents reluctantly agreed to this, though I did not share their sentiments. Instead, my heart was racing at the thought of that weekend in the real Lagos!

That Saturday morning, my teary-eyed parents bade me farewell as Victor put me onto his rickety motorcycle and we rode off to his neighbourhood. Along the way, he had to swerve repeatedly to avoid the many potholes on the road to get to his home, making me nauseous. Several times, my heart leapt as we had near misses with children playing outside their homes and chickens escaping from makeshift coops in the homes.

By the time I got off the motorcycle, my enthusiasm at experiencing the real Lagos had long turned into fear. I had never imagined the danger that Victor must undergo each time he headed home from work. His son, Jemba, welcomed me at the door and he showed me to his "room". It was not a room, but a corner of the house sealed off by a curtain. It was right next to caged chickens which Victor kept in order to provide their family with eggs, and rarely, meat. Jemba did not have a bed but slept on a mat made from straw.

"We will share the mat tonight! Which side do you want?" asked Jemba politely. "The side away from the chickens..." my voice trailed off.

Once I laid my things down, Jemba and I went out to play under the watchful eye of his father. We kicked a small rubber ball around, then chased each other in a game of "Catch", and we threw stones at cans we found on the street. Every hour or so, Victor would walk into the nearest home of a neighbour with a telephone. As the day went on, I began to lose my fear and enjoyed the company of Jemba and Victor. Many children on the street would join us in our games. I had never had so much fun before as everything was spontaneous. When the sun began to set, Victor hurried us home for dinner.

When we arrived at Victor's home, we sat down for a simple dinner of eggs and porridge. Victor's wife offered to cook a chicken for me, but I declined, knowing that in their home, eating chicken was reserved only for very special occasions. My visit certainly did not deserve that. We had a great conversation over dinner and

chatted till it was close to midnight.
