The following is an edited excerpt of an interview with the director of A Night in Enchanted Forest, Mr Justin See:

On the choice of the novel:

The novel A Night in Enchanted Forest is a fantasy adventure story which has captivated children and adults alike for generations. The action-packed and intriguing plot is a guaranteed crowd-puller. The challenge is to reproduce the "obstacle course" found in the story in the realistic setting of West Coast Park. It is my most ambitious project to date, but I have my production team to thank; they were equally excited when I told them about the idea.

On his concept of an outdoor setting for the play:
