I then showed him some seed packets and a small hand shovel. Mr Myles immediately sat up and reached for the seeds eagerly. I pushed him as close to the barrel as I could. After a while, he passed me the shovel impatiently and started using his hands to dig into the soil. Thirty minutes later, he had planted the seeds of roses, poppies and daisies. On the way home afterward, he smiled as he smelled the dirt on his fingers with satisfaction.

That small circle of earth became a second home to both of us. Mr Myles would 25 gesture impatiently at the door as soon as I arrived every morning. I marvelled at how much energy he could muster to care for his little plot. Before long, the seeds began to sprout. What an amazing sight it was to behold Mr Myles' old wrinkled face inspecting his young tender shoots. His eyes gained back some of their life as he weeded and watered with great concentration.

For a while, we kept to ourselves in our little corner and were rather alone on our gardening journey. However, our solitary status ended as a result of a downpour.
